# Enrolment Information

## ENROLMENT SCHEME

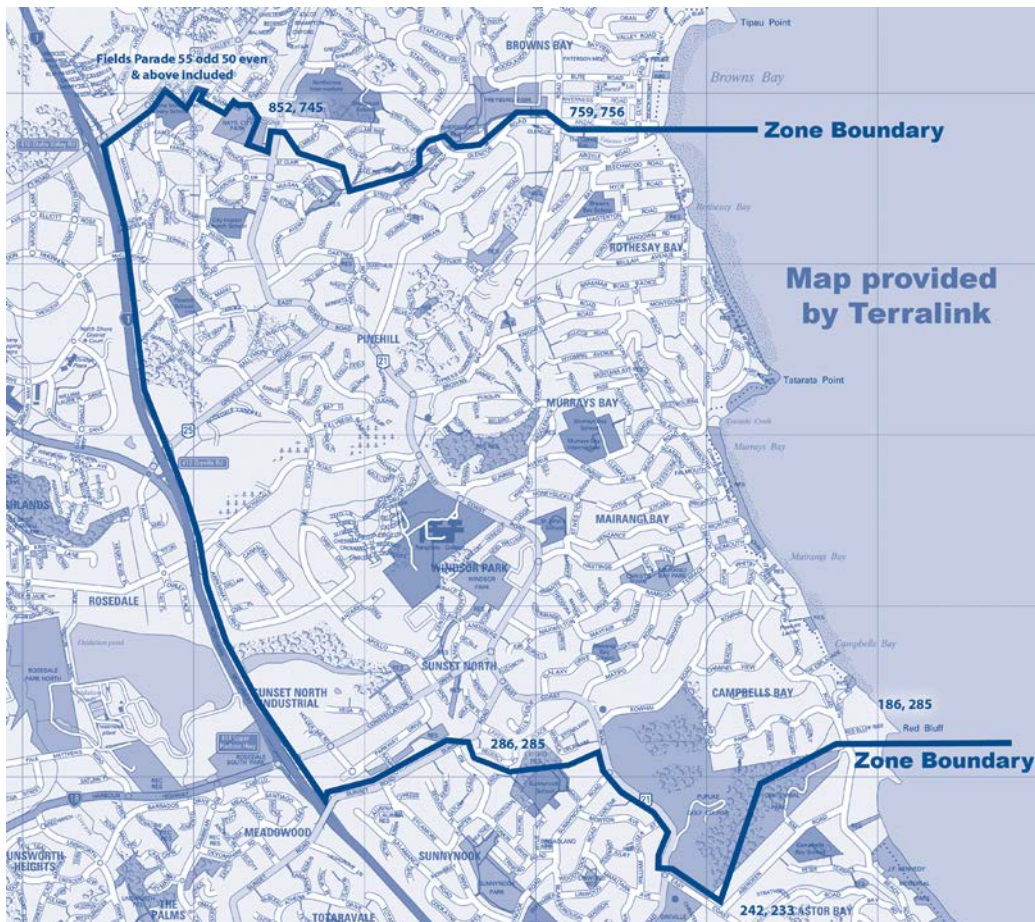
### IN ZONE (HOME) AUTOMATIC ENTRY

All students who live within the **in zone** (home) area described below and shown on the attached map shall be entitled to enrol at the College. From where Browns Bay Road meets the coastline, travel south along the coastline to Campbell's Bay Reserve and Huntly Road. Travel south west along Huntly and south on Beach Road (285 - 759, 186 - 756 included) to Centennial Park. The southern boundary of Centennial Park to East Coast Road (235 - 745, 242 - 852 included). Travel north along East Coast Road to Sunset Road. Travel west along Sunset Road (286, 285 and above included) to Juniper Road (excluded). Regency Place, Lavery Place, Mandica Place, Delamere Court, Stoneleigh Court and Belle Verde Drive are all included. Cross north to and follow Sanders Reserve west to the Northern Busway and the motorway. Follow the motorway north to Oteha Valley Road. Travel east along the centre of Oteha Valley Road to Oteha Valley School. Travel south along Medallion Drive, east along Ferry Hill Way and north east along Fields parade (55, 50 and above included). Travel east across Bay City Park to the intersection of Andersons Road East (excluded) and East Coast Road. Travel south along East Coast Road then east along Oaktree Avenue and Glencoe Road (90, 145 and below included) to Beach Road. Travel south along Beach Road and north east along Browns Bay Road, back to the starting point.

### PROOF OF RESIDENCE WITHIN THE IN ZONE (HOME) AREA WILL BE REQUIRED.

Each year, applications for enrolment in the following year from **in zone** students will be sought by a date which will be published in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the College. This will enable the Board to assess the number of places which can be made available to students who live outside the **in zone** (home) area.

# Automatic Enrolment Application

## AUTOMATIC IN ZONE (HOME) PRE-ENROLMENT APPLICATION

Enrolment for **in zone** (home) Students is a two-stage process to ensure that the College complies with all requirements of the Education Act 1989, and we have the time to thoroughly check the entitlement of students to attend the College.

The first stage for **in zone** (home) applications is the filling in of the **online application forms** including the **in zone statutory declaration**. The completed forms, together with the requested documentation, need to be submitted by **Tuesday 6th August 2019** for an invitation to the first round of transition meetings mid August. You will be invited to a later transition meeting if your application is received after this date.

The Board will carefully check the criteria under which you are applying. Once they are satisfied all criteria have been met, a confirmation email will be sent out along with transition meeting dates and any additional documents required. The Board is bound by the Education Act to ensure that the selection of students in enrolment is fair and transparent. The legislation addresses any attempt by parents to subvert the intent of the legislation to gain unfair access to the College. The Board will conduct checks (once attendance has begun) to confirm genuineness of the living arrangements at the time of application and to ensure that residence within the **in zone** (home) area is maintained.

**It is important that parents advise the College in writing when a change of address occurs.**

## OUT OF ZONE SELECTIVE BALLOT ENROLMENTS

Each year the Board will determine the number of places which are likely to be available in the following year for the enrolment of students who live outside the automatic entry **in zone** (home) area. The Board will publish this information by notice in a community newspaper circulating in the area served by the College. The notice will indicate the method of application and specify a date by which applications must be received.

### APPLICATIONS FOR ENROLMENT WILL BE PROCESSED IN THE FOLLOWING ORDER OF PRIORITY:

**First Priority** will be given to applicants who are siblings of current students

**Second Priority** will be given to applicants who are siblings of former students

**Third Priority** will be given to applicants who are children of a former student of the school

**Fourth Priority** will be given to applicants who are children of a Board employee

**Fifth Priority** will be given to all other applicants

If there are more applicants in the second, third, fourth or fifth priority groups than there are places available, selection within the priority group will be by a ballot conducted in accordance with instructions issued by the Secretary under Section 11G(1) of the Education Act 1989. Parents will be informed of the date of any ballot by notice on the College's website.

Applicants seeking first, second or third priority status may be required to give proof of a sibling relationship.

# General Information

## LIAISON WITH THE COLLEGE

The College welcomes contact with parents. Parents may contact the appropriate Dean about any school matters that concern them and the Deputy Principals and Guidance staff are also available for consultations. Teachers are available on Parents' Evenings held throughout the year. The Parent-Teacher Association arranges meetings on topics of interest to parents. Vista is the College's digital newsletter that is emailed to families every three weeks during Term time. It contains information about College activities, student achievements, term and examination dates, Parents' Evenings and other matters of interest to parents and guardians.

## Forgotten items and Deliveries for Students.

The college office is not able to accept deliveries for students from either caregivers or companies.

We do not take lunch, books, projects or sports equipment; it is a student's responsibility to manage themselves.

The school vision is to actively support students to achieve their highest ability and this includes organisation of self, therefore unless it is an urgent medical or exam related item, the office has instructions to advise caregivers we cannot accept the item.

## CONTACT INFORMATION

The College appreciates [having up to date information](#) on all students. Please inform Reception when addresses, telephone numbers or email addresses change. In some cases the Dean or Nurse needs to contact parents during working hours so the College requires an up-to-date contact address/telephone number of a parent's place of employment. We wish to avoid embarrassment to parents due to incorrectly addressed mail, therefore would also appreciate being informed in cases where marital status changes.

## ANNUAL PARENT DONATION

The Board of Trustees ask that parents make a minimum annual contribution to the school of \$275 for one child or \$500 per family. In addition, they are requesting parents consider an additional donation of \$50 each under the headings of Performing Arts, Sports and School Environment.

The general donation is used to help pay for the full-time nurse and school medical centre, extra careers, guidance and learning support as well as the school magazine, 'Panorama'.

Materials fees and costs for individual subjects appear in the hand out describing courses. These will need to be paid on-line at the beginning of next year when subject selection is finalised.

## ABSENCES

### Sickness

When students are absent because of sickness, parents are required to email, phone (or school app notification) the Attendance Office on the first day of absence from school.

## Visit to Doctor or Dentist

Students may make appointments with a doctor or dentist in school time, although it is obviously less disruptive if appointments can be made after school. If Year 13 Students are unable to schedule these appointments after school they are advised to make these appointments in their study period to avoid missing out on valuable classtime. The student should bring the appointment card or parents should email the Attendance Office and then sign out at the Attendance Office before they leave school for the appointment and sign in upon their return.

## Sickness during the School Day

The College has a fully trained nurse in attendance at the Health Centre between 8.40am and 3.20pm. The nurse can give permission for students to go home sick at any time and will normally contact parents when this occurs. If the nurse is not available students should see their Dean or in extreme cases one of the Deputy Principals. Under **NO** circumstances are students allowed to leave the school grounds without seeing a staff member first.

## Other Absences

Parents should be aware that the Education Act 1989 requires that children in a New Zealand secondary school must attend school 190 days each year, unless they are prevented from doing so by illness or other reasons stated in the Act or allowed by the Principal. The Education Act does not allow absences such as holidays in school time, shopping or looking after other members of the family. The school attempts to meet any reasonable requests from parents for leave, but parents of senior students especially, need to be aware of the restrictions associated with internal assessments. The full support of parents in these matters is an important factor in preventing truancy and in keeping young people out of trouble.

## THE LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CENTRE

## Online Systems

The College has an online portal that provides caregivers with easy access to information relating to their child. Timetable and subject information, live reporting and comprehensive analysis of attendance, detailed NCEA assessment information, and academic reports are all available. A comprehensive calendar and the facility to view and make financial payments provide transparency. Significant digital resources are available to assist caregivers to understand and support the work that takes place in the classroom.

# Student Behaviour

## SCHOOL BEHAVIOUR POLICY

Students at Rangitoto College are expected to behave responsibly and accept the discipline and authority of the College. We expect students to behave with courtesy and respect towards each other and especially towards members of the College staff.

## IMPORTANT REMINDERS

### Classroom responsibilities

- attend all classes and tutor periods and arrive punctually
- have all the books/equipment needed for your class ready at the beginning of the lesson
- do not eat in class unless the teacher has given you permission

### Cell phone policy

The cellphone policy states that cellphones are to be **placed in the classroom box or holder**. The only exception to this rule is if the teacher gives you permission to use the device for a specific educational purpose. Students breaking this rule can expect to receive a sanction from their dean.

Cell phone use at break time is discouraged but allowed. If used inappropriately, the student will be banned from having a phone at school for a period of up to ten weeks.

### Respect for property

- look after the classroom, furniture, equipment and grounds
- respect your environment - don't leave rubbish and litter around
- staff offices, teachers' desks, cupboards etc are not to be used by students
- do not take things that belong to other people
- report any loss or damage immediately to the office or a senior staff member
- cellphones, laptops and other digital equipment are bought to school at the owners own risk. The school accepts NO responsibility for loss or damage

### Uniform

- wear correct school uniform and see that it is clean, tidy and clearly named
- **Students are to be dressed in the school uniform. Correct uniform is to be worn from the time** students leave home in the morning, until they return home after school. If it is necessary, for some reason, to wear an article of clothing which is not part of the uniform, including footwear, students are asked to report to a Dean before school who will lend them the correct item for the day.
- Students are to be tidily dressed and boys clean shaven.

Full uniform requirements are on the school website.

## BE HELPFUL, COURTEOUS AND SHOW CONSIDERATION FOR OTHERS

### At all times

- do not leave the school grounds during the day without first getting permission from your Dean or Senior Staff and signing out.
- visitors to the College must go to the office and get permission to be in the school grounds
- skateboards and scooters must be handed in to the gear deposit room before school
- if you need to bring valuable possessions or large amounts of money to school, leave them in the Reception during the school day
- obey the road crossing rules and observe safe traffic behaviour at all times
- do not bring any of the following items to school: chewing gum, cigarettes, vaping materials, matches, lighters, firecrackers of any type, alcohol, illegal drugs, knives, weapons of any kind or laser light equipment of any kind
- parents dropping off or collecting students, are **not permitted to enter the grounds** using the East Coast Road entrance. Please use the entrance of f Graham Collins Drive

## STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

Students must observe the school rules set down by the Board of Trustees and contained in the Behaviour Policy.

The following are drawn to the attention of parents as being areas where parental co-operation is especially sought:

- All students are expected to remain at school on site throughout the school day (this includes Yr13 during their study periods).
- Students may not park their cars in the school grounds or car parks.
- Students cycling to school are required to wear a protective helmet and must always walk their bikes in and out of the grounds.
- School discipline applies from the time students leave home in the morning until they return home after school.
- The school may keep a student on detention until 4.50pm. Parents will be notified by the Deputy Principal, in advance. In addition, individual teachers may keep a student until 3.45pm without notice.

# Uniforms Policy

## GROOMING

The school expects all students to take pride in their appearance and to dress neatly at all times. Shoes should be kept clean and regularly polished. The local community and the Board of Trustees (their elected representatives) expect this, and we seek the full co-operation of all parents and students.

## GENERAL POINTS

- Students need to take responsibility for their uniform and not leave items such as jackets and jumpers lying around.
- CLOTHING SHOULD BE CLEARLY NAMED. Unnamed articles cannot be identified and returned to their owners.
- Bare feet is not permitted at any level for health and safety reasons.
- Only a Rangitoto College school jacket must be worn as protection from the rain.
- Non-uniform jackets, sweatshirts or hoodies are NOT permitted at any time for Years 9-12.
- Year 13 are not required to wear school uniform. There is a dress code, details of which will be issued to Year 13 students. The emphasis is not only on appropriateness but also on looking neat and presentable.
- The Blazer may be worn over the jersey for extra warmth.
- The correct school uniform is to be worn at all times including to and from school.
- If a student **comes to school in an incorrect garment or non-regulation footwear** they **must report to the Dean before 8.40 am** where they will be lent the correct item/s for the day. The only exception to this is if a student has a foot injury which makes the wearing of the correct shoes impossible. In this case the student should take a note from their parent/guardian to the Dean before school. They will give them a signed exception slip which they need to carry for the duration of the problem.
- If students are wearing an incorrect piece of clothing or jewellery, it will be confiscated and given to their Dean. Confiscated items are given back **after school each Friday.**

## PE UNIFORM

For 2020 all Year 9 and Year 10 students are required to wear the PE shirt that is available to be purchased from Janbells in Mairangi Bay. The shirt is compulsory but can be worn with any plain navy or black shorts or leggings.

## JUNIOR UNIFORM

### ONE OF:

**Skirt** – Knee length, dark navy poly/wool blend with centre front pleat and side zip (security) pocket. Skirt to be worn on the waist, **skirt length not to be altered**, must be worn on the knee (not shorter).

**Shorts** – Plain, dark navy dress shorts (no front pleats). Expandable waist with zip (security) pocket. College logo on back. To be worn on the waist. A girl's version of the shorts is available, if preferred, by order from the uniform stockist, and will be made to measure.

*Please note:* The skirt needs to be **knee length for Year 9 and Year 10**. Please purchase a size that allows for growth over these two years to keep the skirt length on the knee. Students are NOT PERMITTED to roll up their skirts or shorts to shorten them.

### ONE OF:

**Blouse** – Mid-blue, polyester, shaped blouse with College logo on bottom left front hem. To be worn out over skirt. T-shirts or other visible tops are **NOT** to be worn under the blouse.

**Shirt** – Mid-blue polyester short sleeve shirt. College logo on bottom left front. To be worn out over the shorts. Sleeves not to be rolled up. T-shirts or other tops are not to be worn under the shirt.

### ONE OF:

#### Jersey/Zipped Cardigan

**Jersey** – Dark shaped navy 'V' neck with red 'tipping' around neck and front edge. College logo on left front.

**OR Cardigan** – Dark Navy, zipped front with red 'tipping' around neck and front edge of zip. College logo on left front.

## SENIOR UNIFORM

### ONE OF:

**Skirt** – Mid-Calf, dark navy poly/wool blend straight skirt with two front pleats and side zip (security) pocket. Skirt to be worn on the waist. **Skirt length not to be altered**, must be worn mid-calf.

**Shorts** – Plain, Dark navy dress shorts (no front pleats). Expandable waist with zip (security) pocket. College logo on back. To be worn on the waist. Girl's version of shorts is available by order from the uniform stockist and will be made to measure.

**Trousers** – plain, dark navy trousers. To be worn mid-hip. College logo on back. Can be worn all year round. **Trouser leg not to be altered or tapered in**.

### ONE OF:

**Blouse** – White polyester shaped blouse with College logo on bottom left front hem. To be worn out over skirt.

**Shirts** – White polyester shirt with College logo on bottom left front. To be worn out over the shorts. Sleeves not to be rolled up. T-shirts or other tops are not to be worn under the shirt.

### ONE OF:

#### Jersey/Zipped Cardigan

**Jersey** – Red shaped 'V' neck with dark navy 'tipping' around neck and front edge. College logo on left front.

**OR Cardigan** – Red, zipped front with navy 'tipping' around neck and front edge of zip. College logo on left front.

### ONE OF:

#### Socks/Tights: Juniors & Seniors

White ankle socks can be worn all year round. Navy blue tights can be worn when cold. **Note:** Socks are not to be worn with the navy tights. Dark blue with two red Stripes. To be worn pulled up.

## PRESENTATION

### Jewellery

- One (1) pair of small (no bigger than 6mm) **plain studs** or **sleepers** (no bigger than 8mm) **TO BE WORN IN THE EAR ONLY**.
- One (1) thin gold or silver chain necklace
- One (1) plain ring **TO BE WORN ON THE HAND ONLY**
- One (1) silver or gold bangle or bracelet
- Ankle adornments are **not** permitted
- Ear stretchers/spacers of any kind (including clear are not to be worn while at school and at anytime while representing the school

### Make Up

- Lipstick and eye make-up ARE NOT PERMITTED.
- A NATURAL LOOK foundation is permitted.
- Nailpolish is permitted as long as it is a transparent (clear). No colours are permitted (including white). Students are not permitted to have acrylic, shellac or french tip type enhancements. Nails must be kept short and neat. Makeup rules apply to all students, including Year 13.

### Appearance

- Any facial piercing is against school rules and no student will be allowed in class with visible piercing. Piercing **cannot** merely be covered up with a piece of plaster. Clear plastic keepers can be worn for the first few weeks if they are needed to keep a hole from closing up, as long as they are **not visible** and lie flat against the face.
- Jewellery rules apply to all students, including Year 13.
- Tattoos must be covered at all times, either by a plain, neutral skin toned sleeve, a long-sleeved white school shirt, or by any other means deemed appropriate by the Deputy Principal. Tattoo rules apply to all students, including Year 13. Exemptions may be available for culturally significant tattoos, at the discretion of the Deputy Principal.
- Students must be clean shaven.

**NOTE:** The uniform must be purchased from **Janbells** (Mairangi Bay) who are the only stockist of College Uniform.

#### Blazer – Optional for all year levels

Tailored dark navy, polyester/wool gabardine with thin red stripe, lined jacket. College logo on left front. Security pocket inside. There is a requirement that any student in a premier sports or cultural team will have a blazer. The blazer is to be **worn with school navy trousers or skirts only**. All student leaders are required to have their own blazer.

**Ties** – Navy and red striped with College logo embossed throughout the tie. To be worn on formal occasions.

**Students are not to wear other tops / t-shirts under their shirts/blouses.**

**Shoes** – Plain, black, leather, polishable lace-up shoes. For health and safety reasons shoes are required to be sturdy and support the foot and have a heel of approximately 1.5-2cm. Boots, ballet shoes, skate and sport shoes are NOT PERMITTED. Shoes are to be worn all year round. Shoe Science in Albany and Takapuna offers 20% discount off the retail price of approved Rangitoto College black uniform shoes. Shoe Clinic Albany Mall offers a \$10 rebate back to the College when purchasing from their store.

**Jackets** – School jackets only are permitted. Sports jackets and hoodies are **not** to be worn with the school uniform.

**Scarves** – Scarves are permitted to be worn as long as they are the red and blue of the school uniform. No other colours are permitted.
